Major shakeup in City planning

A major shakeup is underway in the City of Sisters' planning department, which has been the focus of intense scrutiny and criticism over several issues in recent months.

Sisters Community Development Director Pauline Hardie resigned Friday afternoon. The resignation will take effect March 20; she will remain on staff until then to wrap up her duties and orient a replacement.

"She has accepted a position with the City of Bend,"

Sisters woman to help kids in Guatemala

Each year for the past five years, Amy Abramson of Blue Burro Imports has traveled to Guatemala and returned with colorful clothing, accessories, and jewelry that she sells in her Sisters boutique. This year, she's taking things with her that she'll leave in Guatemala: Donated school supplies for the children of the village of Panajachel.

"This is where I stay every year, so I've become very fond of the community," Abramson explained. "I've wanted to volunteer and donate every year, and it's never worked out. For some reason the doors opened for me this year to be able to do

Through February 4, Abramson is collecting new and used school supplies backpacks, markers, paper, crayons, pencils, sharpeners — to take with her when she travels to Guatemala next month. Donations may be brought to Blue Burro Imports at 161 N. Elm St., Unit B (in the big yellow building next to Sisters Market). Cash donations are also welcome.

Abramson is working through MayanFamilies.org. The charity identifies numerous needs among the rural indigenous population, and school supplies stood out to
