Council Has Busy Session

An ordinance was passed establishing street grades for the city and the recorder ordered to notify the railroad company that a grade had been established and asking them to put railroad street on grade, also plank or other wise make the track crossable for wagons through town. FIRE AT FALLS CITY

Monday night the Falls City Mill owned by the Falls City Lumber Company, located about a mile and a half above Falls City was completely destroyed by fire entailing a loss of about \$35,000. This plant was one of the largest in this section and was an extensive shipper of lumber. It is not known to us whether the plant will be rebuilt at once or what insurance was carried by the company.
