THE CIVIL SERVICE.

Another Amendment Approved by President Cleveland.

Washington, Nov. 11.-The presient today approved an amendment to the civil service which will result in bringing many postmasters and employes within the classified service.

The amendment is as follows: "And whenever, by order of the postmaster-general, a by-office shall be consolidated with and made part of any postoffice where free delivery is established, all employes of the office person holding at the date of said order the position of postmaster of the office thus consolidated with said free delivery office may be assigned any postition therein and given any appropriate designation under the classification act which the postmaster-general may di-

rect." It is the intention of the postoffice department to consolidate many offices. This consolidation will not necessarily do away with the offices, but establish them as stations of some central point. It is probable that presidential, as well as fourth-class offices, will be included
