FOR THE PURPOSE OF BONDING THE CITY OF VALE IN THE SUM OF \$55,000.00 TO INSTALL A FLOW LINE, AND TO COMPLETE THE WATER SYSTEM.

Notice is hereby given that under and by virtue of an Ordinance, the same being No. 64, and entitled an "Ordinance making provisions for submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Vale, the question of voting to bond the said City in the sum of \$55,000.00, to install a flow line, and to furnish a gravity system, for the purpose of furnishing the City with an adequate water supply, and providing for the time and date of redemption of said bonds, and fixing the rate of interest the said bonds shall bear" which said Ordinance was passed by the Common Council of Vale and approved by the Mayor, on the 1st day of October, 1910: And also, by virtue of resolution passed unanimously by the Common Council of said City on said date, which said resolution fixed the time and place for the holding of such election.

NOW THEREFORE, Notice is hereby given to all of the qualified voters of Vale, that on Wednesday, the 19th day of October 1910, beginning at the hour of 1 o'clock p. m. and continuing until 4 o'clock p. m. of said day an election will be held at the Council Room of said City, to vote on the question of bonding the said City in the sum of \$55,000.00, to install a flow line and gravity water system, which said bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, which said interest will be payable semi-annually; and which said bonds will run for a period of not less than ten years, nor than for a longer period of twenty years; and the said question to be so submitted will be in the following form:

Mr. Pence also reported that the Westfall hotel had changed hands on Monday, Ivan Hart having taken charge of the business.

HEAVY BLACK OIL IN VALE OIL WELLS

struck a very hard oil cap in the last few days drilling which I take to be the dividing line that lays between this sand and the true oil sand underneath. I believe the Malheurs have reached the point where they may expect to meet with success in a short time. This well is down over 2000 feet and in excellent condition.

Heavier Oil Brought Up.

"I next called at the Columbia, found Messrs. Parker and Napton, president and vice-president of the company, in charge. I was agreeably surprised at the improved conditions here which seemed to be no less than at the other wells just mentioned. The drill was down about 1100 feet in what would be termed green shale in California. Considerable oil, shown in the sludge bailed from the well which had a real petroleum odor, was heavier and much more permanent than any which had ever been seen in this well. It was the real thing. From every source of knowledge, I feel confident that the Columbia boys will soon be rewarded for their hard work and earnest efforts. This well is all cased and in excellent condition.

"The Eastern Oregon are casing preparatory to drilling deeper the present site hole. They report everything going fine and indications very promising. They have been drilling in a hard black rock the past 200 feet. Mr. Hunt, driller and contractor, is of the opinion that when this rock is passed through that they will strike the oil sand. It would look as though the Eastern Ore. Co. had the grapevine twist on adversity and I would advise pushing ahead with all possible speed.

"The Mammoth is waiting on a car of casing at present. They are down about 1200 feet in good formation.

Close To Real Oil Sand.

"I wish to lay particular stress on the noticeable features of improvements in all of the wells. First an increased pressure and flow of gas with a strong petroleum odor; second a presence of larger quantities of oil of a much darker, heavier body and of a less volatile nature that leaves no doubt of its being a real thing and that the drills are in close proximity to oil sand.
"There are several how rigs talked of and two of these are now on the way. Everything is looking exceedingly oily and there is no occasion for complaint. While the farmer is skimming the surface and making his profits from the hide, as it were, the oil men are going down after the tenderlin and tallow.

"In conclusion I wish to repeat my former statement made nearly two years ago, that in the Malheur oil-gas field lies the future prosperity of the state of Oregon and further add that it is my opinion that California will have to keep in good training for this state may some day hold the petroleum championship.

STATE NEWS OF GREAT INTEREST

\$115,000,000 of Agricultural Products - Louis Hill Visits Portland

Portland, Ore., Oct. 15. (Special)—Oregon's agricultural products this year will amount to no less than \$115,000,000, according to the estimate of Dr. James Whitcomb, director of the government experiment station at Corvallis. Add to this figure the many millions derived from its timber manufactures, mining and commerce, and it is not surprising that Oregon is such a prosperous state.

An energetic campaign will be carried on throughout the Northwest for more hog raisers. Following a conference at Spokane during the past week, it was decided to get the railroads, the agricultural colleges and the newspapers to work in co-operation to arouse interest among the farmers. An information bureau on the hog question will be maintained by the Portland Union Stockyards company and a systematic effort made to turn the attention of the farm population toward this profitable industry.

President Louis Hill of the Great Northern, accompanied by a party of prominent business men of Minnesota, have toured the Northwest during the past week and investigated business conditions. They were entertained in Portland by the Commercial club. At a dinner given them they expressed the opinion that no section of the country can show the prosperous conditions found in the Pacific Northwest states.

Sumpter will hold a mining congress October 20 and 21 that will attract attention from mining men from all districts of the state as well as many from nearby states. There is considerable revival of mining in the Sumpter district particularly and on this account there is a great deal of interest in the coming gathering.

The increase in livestock production throughout the Northwest following the establishment of a big market at Portland is shown in receipts at the local packing plants. One day last week receipts at the stockyards were over 4000 head. These animals were shipped from various localities in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana and such deliveries show that the money formerly going East for large shipments of livestock is being kept here at home.
