Joe Veliky, of Malheur, was in the city a few days ago and made a filing on a homestead in the Malheur country.

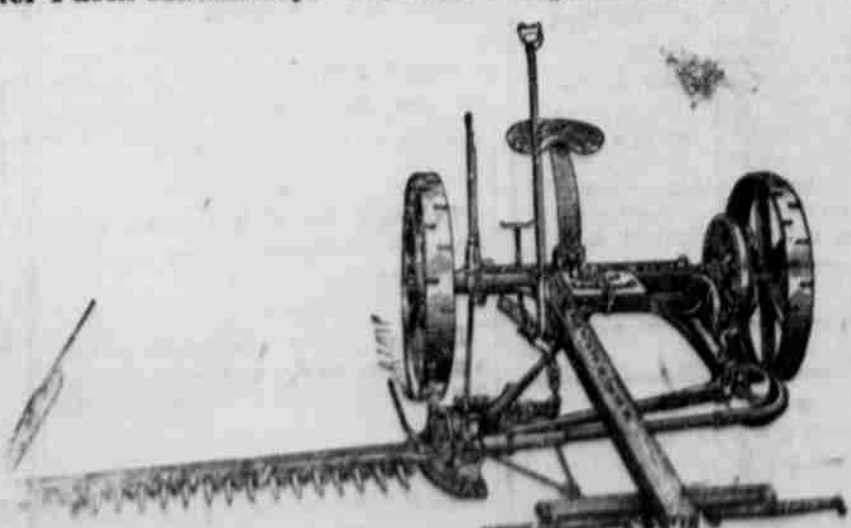
Dr. C. J. Bartlett reports the birth of a daughter to Mr. and Mrs. Gene High of this city Friday, June the fifth.
