A long-time employee of Marion County Fire District #1 has been selected as its new chief.

Terry Riley as the new chief of the district at its meeting last week. Riley had served as interim chief since the departure of J. Kevin Henson last October.

Riley's appointment was effective immediately.

Lemonade Day returns Keizer driver at wheel in more cities, with **crowd-funding support**

A crowd-funding campaign launched by Lemonade Day reached 50 percent of its goal in the first day.

The nonprofit organization is aiming to raise \$12,500 to begin funding the program as it expands into Portland and Eugene for the first time this year on May 3. The Oregon cities are the first of the nation wide Lemonade Day organization to utilize crowdfunding. The 30 day Indiegogo campaign will end on Feb. 12.

Funds from the campaign will be used to cover the cost of educational materials given to each kid which keeps the program free for them to participate in. The record breaking success of the program in Salem last year presented the opportunity to be in Portland and Eugene.

in pedestrian death

An unfortunate set of circumstances proved fatal last Thursday, Jan. 15.

According to a release from the Salem Police Department, 77-year-old David McGregor of Salem was attempting to cross Center Street around 5:45 a.m. that day when he was struck and killed by a van driven by 64-year-old Stephen Buchanan of Keizer.

"Mr. McGregor was in an unmarked crosswalk attempting to cross Center Street from the south side to the north side when he was struck by the 2005 full-sized van being operated by Mr. Buchanan," the release stated. "He was wearing dark clothing and was walking very slowly with a cane at the time of the incident."

McGregor was nounced dead at the scene. Buchanan stopped immediately and cooperated with the investigation into the incident. Center Street was closed for more than three hours as officials reconstructed the accident scene.

No arrests were made and no citations were issued as the investigation continues.

In light of the incident, the SPD issued a reminder of safety tips for pedestrians. These tips include being visible and vigilant while walking on and around roadways, crossing roads at intersections and in crosswalks, looking both ways before crossing any road and making eye contact with approaching drivers, not assuming drivers see you just because you are in a crosswalk, wearing bright and reflective clothing and carrying a light as well as having some type of flashing light to improve the chances of being
