An Ordinance Ordering an Election for City Offices of . the City of St. Johns and Fixing the Time and Place Therefor; and Naming the Judges and Clerks to Officiate Thereat.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as

Section 1. That the city of St. Johns hold an election in the city of St. Johns on the 3d day of April, 1911, for the purpose of electing city officers for said city, as follows to wit: A mayor, a city recorder, a city treasurer and a city attorney; also for the purpose of electing councilmen for the city as follows, to-wit: 2 councilmen of the first ward, 2 councilmen of the second ward and 3

ouncilmen at large.

Section 2. And it is hereby ordered hat said election be held on the 3d day day of April, 1911, in the manner pro-vided by the charter of the city of St.

Section 3. It is hereby ordered that the following judges and clerks of said election be, and they are hereby appointed, to-wit:

Judges of the first ward: Gilbert Good-hue, Marion Johnston, L. B. Martin. Judges of the second ward: L. B. Chipman, S. W. Rogers, Fred Brown. Clerks of the first ward: Otis Learned and A. W. Markle.

Clerks of the second ward: A. D. Mc-Donald and Chas. E. Bailey. Section 4. That the voting and poll-ing places of such election be, and they are hereby fixed as follows, to-wit: Polling place for the first ward; Learned's real estate office, Jersey and Richmond

streets.
Polling place for Second Ward-City

Section 5. That the city recorder be, and is hereby ordered and directed to give notice of said election by publication in a newspaper published in the city of St. Johns for at least ten days prior to said election.
Section 6. That the Chief of Police be

and is hereby ordered to post, not less than ten days before such election, notices thereof, which said notices shall be prepared and signed by the city record-er and shall specify the officers to be elected and the time and place of holding said election.
