It Doesn't Matter

Editor Review: Is there anything in the rumor that the land on the west side of the river used by the present ferry company with approaches is not a county road and is liable to be withdrawn from usage for this purpose at any time?

Subscriber: It is our understanding that the land in question has been dedicated as a county road. But it makes no difference so far as getting a free ferry is concerned. According to the bill passed the only obligation upon the part of the city of St. Johns is to provide the approaches, slips and pontoons. Land was not mentioned. If the west side landing place is not on a county road it is no affair of this city's. We have fulfilled all our requirements when the approaches, slips and pontoons have been secured and the franchise surrendered. The county can then wrestle with the land having to do with the ferry proposition. There is no particular landing place designated on the west side in the bill, but the foot of Pittsburg street on the east side is specified. It may be moved later at the option of the county commissioners, if deemed advisable.

ORDINANCE NO. 358

An Ordinance Ordering an Election for City Offices of the City of St. Johns and Fixing the Time and Place Thereof; and Naming the Judges and Clerks to Officiate Thereat.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the city of St. Johns hold an election in the city of St. Johns on the 3d day of April, 1911, for the purpose of electing city officers for said city, to-wit: A mayor, a city recorder, a city treasurer and a city attorney; also for the purpose of electing councilmen for the city as follows, to-wit: 2 councilmen of the first ward, 2 councilmen of the second ward and 3 councilmen at large.

Section 2. And it is hereby ordered that said election be held on the 3d day of April, 1911, in the manner provided by the charter of the city of St. Johns.

Section 3. It is hereby ordered that the following judges and clerks of said election be, and they are hereby appointed, to-wit:

Judges of the first ward: Gilbert Goodhue, Marion Johnston, L. B. Martin.
Judges of the second ward: L. B. Chipman, S. W. Rogers, Fred Brown.
Clerks of the first ward: Otis Learned and A. W. Markle.
Clerks of the second ward: A. D. McDonald and Chas. E. Bailey.

Section 4. That the voting and polling places of such election be, and they are hereby fixed as follows, to-wit: Polling place for the first ward: Learned's real estate office, Jersey and Richmond streets.
Polling place for Second Ward—City Hall.

Section 5. That the city recorder be, and is hereby ordered, and directed to give notice of said election by publication in a newspaper published in the city of St. Johns for at least ten days prior to said election.

Section 6. That the Chief of Police be and is hereby ordered to post, not less than ten days before such election, notices thereof, which said notices shall be prepared and signed by the city recorder and shall specify the officers to be elected and the time and place of holding said election.

Passed by the Council this 6th day of March, 1911.

Beginning at an iron pipe which marks the southeast corner of the Caples addition to the city of St. Johns in section twelve (12), township one (1), north of range one (1), west of the Willamette Meridian, thence south 71 degrees 14 minutes east 238.51 feet to an iron pipe, being the northeast corner of the Caples addition to the City of St. Johns; thence south 20 degrees west along the easterly line of said Caples addition to St. Johns 478.57 feet to the place of beginning, containing 2.62 acres, more or less, save and except a tract of land in the southwest corner thereof 125 feet on Dawson street by 150 feet deep, which said property belongs to H. E. Harris.

That a special election be held in the city of St. Johns in accordance with the requirements of said charter of said city on the 3d day of April, 1911, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the city of St. Johns the following proposition, to-wit: "Shall the City of St. Johns incur a municipal bonded indebtedness in the sum of Twenty-one Thousand Dollars (\$21,000) for the purpose of purchasing the first tract of land above described, to-wit: Beginning at an iron pipe which marks the southeast corner of Caples addition to the city of St. Johns in section 12 of township 1, north of range 1, west of the Willamette meridian; thence south 17 degrees 14 minutes east 238.51 feet along the northerly side line of the City Suburban railway right of way to an iron pipe; thence north 20 degrees east 478.57 feet to an iron pipe; thence north 71 degrees 14 minutes east 238.51 feet to an iron pipe; being the northeast corner of the Caples addition to the city of St. Johns; thence south 20 degrees west along the easterly line of said Caples addition to the City of St. Johns 478.57 feet to the place of beginning, containing 2.62 acres, more or less, save and except a tract of land in the southwest corner thereof 125 feet on Dawson street by 150 feet deep, from H. E. RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns: That it does hereby order, and is necessary to improve Chicago street from the east side line of Jersey street to the west side line of Portland boulevard in the City of St. Johns in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading same to sub grade and by placing a strip of macadam in the center of said street full length, said strip of macadam to be 18 feet wide, eight inches thick in the center and six inches deep on either side.

The wooden crosswalks in said street to be taken up for the purpose of said improvement and same to be relaid to the satisfaction of the city engineer; according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots and parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon or approximate to Chicago street, from the marginal line of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 55."

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Chicago street is \$2,229.78.

That the cost of said Chicago street to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the charter of the city of St. Johns.
