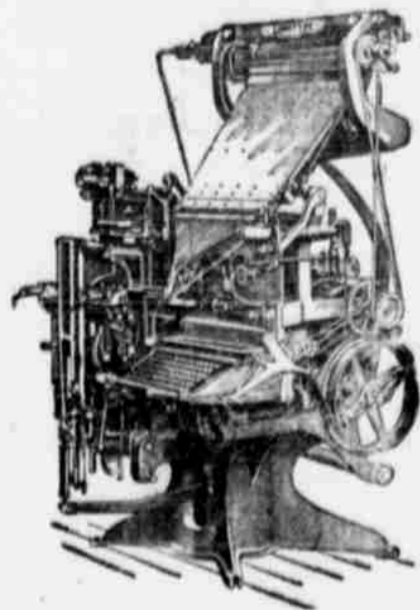

**The St. Johns Study Club**

The St. Johns Study Club, organized for the purpose, as their adopted motto indicates, of promoting education of members by concerted effort, has an enrollment of thirty-one ladies of the St. Johns district. The club has planned a definite program for the season, extending from the 12th of last October up to and including the 24th of May of the present year. Meetings are held at the St. Johns Library on the afternoon of the first and third Wednesdays of each month.

The program of study this year centers around the history of Oregon and includes the early pioneer history, early political history and the Oregon system of today, Oregon industries, Oregon writers and historic places in Oregon.
