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Announces Candidacy

Dow V. Walker has announced his candidacy for the office of County Commissioner. He is a most active St. Johns citizen and has resided here for the past 29 years. He had much to do in securing some of our civic improvements and utilities and undoubtedly would make a splendid County Commissioner.

In announcing his candidacy he has the following to say: "The taxpayers are entitled to an honest, efficient and business-like administration. Immediate reduction in the cost of government is absolutely necessary. The taxpayers are more interested in having their officials devote their energies to reducing the



cost of government than devising ways and means of increasing the amount of tax money to be raised. I assume that all projects under way at this time should be carried to completion; but no new projects of any kind should be initiated during these times, except under pressing public necessity, and then only after a careful and thorough investigation of probable cost, with the money on hand or in sight before beginning the work. We can well declare a "holiday" on spending public funds, until at least we can catch up and get our breath. I believe in patronizing home industries and the employment of home people. Let us keep our money in circulation at home whenever possible and consistent with good business methods. Too much money leaves the state. We should encourage more industries and factories, which mean larger payrolls. We also should encourage more home building and tilling of the soil, which means good citizenship. Full recognition of the duty we owe to the ex-service men and women must be given. Public officials should cooperate with them to their fullest extent by assisting them to get re-established or to get a start. The wage earner and his family are entitled to a square deal. He should render loyal, faithful and honest service, for which he should receive honest and just compensation. The County Commissioners are responsible for the operation, maintenance and upkeep of the county's roads, bridges and ferries, as well as all of the County institutions. Politics should be eliminated from the business administration of the County's affairs, and common ordinary business methods will bring the desired results. I propose to make a careful, systematic, detailed study of the County's affairs, in order that I will be better able to run it in a business-like way, without any noise or buncombe. It is possible that some of the County and City departments can be consolidated thereby effecting a saving to the tax payers, but at this time I do not feel warranted in making any recommendations. I do however take exceptions to the present practice in connection with the management of the Intestate bridge, the "side money" or the \$50 per month drawn by each of the Commissioners in addition to his regular salary of \$250 per month. It appears irregular and is certainly establishing a bad precedent in the administration of public affairs.
