OREGON WEATHER REPORT.

S. Pague's Crop-Weather Bulletin for the Week Ending Saturday, August 29.

WEATHER.
The temperature has been from 10 to 25 degrees a day above the average, the maximum ranging from 90 to 100 degrees on the 26th, 27th and 28th. Today has been warm but cooler. The season of extreme heat is or should be about over. No rain fell during the week. The weather has been cloudless, bright on the coast in mornings, and more in the interior valleys.

CROPS.
Wheat is all cut and much of it threshed. In every section the yield has been above the expectations of even the best sanguine. The wheat is plump, heavy and of excellent quality. Oats, corn, clover and alfalfa are large in yield. There has been very little injury to the crops. In Curry county the wheat has been injured slightly by the blight of Marion county. The wheat will be busy for two weeks. The corn is picking up next Monday. In some sections considerable damage has been done by the blight, while in other sections there will be a good average crop. In some sections the alfalfa is not so good and no damage has been done. The alfalfa is ripening rapidly and is very good. Tomatoes and watermelons are now generally ripening. The hot weather has been slightly injurious to the crops, clover, corn, and to young orchards. In Curry county the second crop of red clover is heading, and the third crop of alfalfa has been cut, each crop averaging in stalk 22 inches in length.

FARMERS OREGON.—WEATHER.
Continued hot weather with maximum temperatures of from 90 to 105 degrees, have prevailed. No rain fell. The sky has been cloudless, with smoke appearing in the atmosphere.

CROPS.
The weather has been slightly injurious to the corn, but favorable to fruit, alfalfa, and grain harvesting. Fruit and alfalfa are ripening rapidly and are very abundant. The wheat is nearly all cut and threshed. In Wasco and parts of Sherman county spring and fall wheat is somewhat shrunken. In Gilliam, Morrow and Umatilla counties the wheat crops as a whole was never better. Harvesting is in progress west and south of the Blue mountains. Union county especially has a fine crop of cereals, but all sections have crops above the average. In a few places in the wheat sections of Grant county, prices are about 20 per cent higher than last year with an upward tendency. Farmers are happy and prosperous times prevail throughout Oregon.
