OREGON WEATHER REPORT.

S. Pague's Crop-Weather Bulletin for the Week Ending Saturday, August 29.

WEATHER.—The temperature has been from 10 to 12 degrees a day above the average, the maximum ranging from 90 to 100 degrees on the 26th, 27th, and 28th. Today has been warm but cooler. The season of extreme heat is or should be over. No rain fell during the week. The weather has been cloudless, shining on the coast in mornings, and cloudy in the interior valleys.

CROPS.—Wheat is all cut and much of it threshed. In every section the yield has been above the expectations of even the sown. The wheat is plump and of excellent quality. Oats, barley and rye are all in large in yield; have been injured slightly by the heat of Marion county. The wheat will be busy for two weeks. Hay picking begins next Monday. Some considerable damage has been done to the rice, while in other places there will be a good average crop. The potato crop is not yet harvested and no damage has been done. It is ripening rapidly and is very small. Tomatoes and cantaloupes are now generally ripening. The hot weather has been slightly injurious to the crops, clover, corn, and to young plants. In Curry county the second crop of red clover is heading, and the third crop of alfalfa has been cut, each crop averaging in stalk 22 inches in height.

FAIRIES OREGON.—WEATHER.

Continued hot weather with maximum temperatures of from 90 to 105 degrees, we prevailed. No rain fell. The sky has been cloudless, with smoke appearing in the atmosphere.

CROPS.—

The weather has been slightly injurious to the corn, but favorable to fruit, vegetables, and grain harvesting. Fruit and vegetables are ripening rapidly and are very plentiful. The wheat is nearly all cut, except of the Blue mountains, and considerable has been threshed. All reports now that it is turning out much better than was expected. In Wasco and parts Sherman county spring and fall wheat somewhat shriveled. In Gilliam, Crook and Umatilla counties the wheat up to a whole was never better. Harvesting is in progress east and south of the Blue mountains; Union county especially has fine crop of cereals, but all counties have crops above the average found in the wheat in sections of Grant county. Prices are about 20 per cent higher than last year with an upward tendency. Farmers are happy, and prosperous times prevail throughout Oregon.
