## LAYING CABLE NOW

HONOLULU AND UNITED STATES WILL EXCHANGE CHRISTMAS GREETINGS

Sending Message Now From Mid-Ocean - Jeffries Couldn't Knock a Miner out in Four Rounds-Emerson College and N E Conservatory Allied

San Francisco, Dec. 19 .- The first link of the great Ocean cable which is to connect the United States with Hawaii has been laid, and the cable ship Silverton is pro-ceeding so rapidly with the work that it would not at all be surprising if Christmas greetings from Governor Dole, of Hawaii, to President Rooseveltare sent over the cable from Honolulu on Christmas day.

At noon today Io54 knots of cable had been reeled off from the hold of 30 30 the Silverton, to rest on the bottom of old ocean, in 130 hours after leaving San Francisco, and this in spite of a very severe storm, which retarded the work. If a slightly better ratio is maintained during the next five days, with no storm or accident to interfere, it is reasonable to expect that communication with Honolulu will be had on Christmas day.

board the Silverton filed the following message from the vessel at noon

"Latitude 30:18 north, longitude 139:38 west. The total amount of cable laid up to noon today, which includes the first section, the laying of which was completed last night at 8 o'clock, was 1054 knots. The weather is fine."
