Gearhart considers regulating rentals

City to send out poll to residents

GEARHART — A City Council workshop on short-term rentals turned into a discussion of what quality of life Gearhart residents are seeking.

"It's not the Gearhart we've known," Mayor Dianne Widdop said, describing visitors who "don't participate in the neighborhood" and are here "more for the partying." "People really care about their neighborhoods," she said. "It's important to us."

The council has heard from divided residents, some aggravated by a proliferation of short-term rentals in the community and others who profit from the business.

"We've received over 30 letters from each side, for and against," City Manager Chad Sweet said.

City Councilor Dan Jesse worked on the issue in Seaside and discussed it as a member of Gearhart's Planning Commission. "It's very apparent to me that this is a very heated subject for many people on both sides," he said.

A \$2.5 million business

More than 10,000 people come through Gearhart through rentals, Sweet said.

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Animal Control and Shelter Supervisor Stephen Hildreth said the event provides great exposure for animals in need.

Johnson believes citizens can hold agencies accountable

State Sen. Betsy Johnson plans to introduce a bill next year to create a citizen watchdog committee to hold state agencies accountable for meeting spending and policy goals.

Johnson, D-Scappoose, said she has been frustrated by state officials whom she accused of misleading lawmakers about how agencies spend money and the progress of major projects, such as the state's failed Cover Oregon insurance exchange.
