Seaside schools ballots due **Tuesday**

A special election Tuesday gives voters in Seaside School District 10 the option to renew a five-year local option tax to fund operations at the district's four schools.

Voters have until 8 p.m. Tuesday to turn them in at County Clerk's office, 820 Exchange St., Suite 220; Seaside City Hall, 989 Broadway; Gearhart City Hall, 698 Pacific Way; Cannon Beach City Hall, 163 E. Gower and the drop box at 820 Exchange St. in Astoria.

The question on the ballot asks if the district should renew its \$0.52 tax per \$1,000 of assessed property value for five years beginning 2016-17.

The measure renews a current local option tax, in place since 2000 to support the school district, which includes Seaside High School, Broadway Middle School, Seaside Heights Elementary School and Gearhart Elementary School and serves students from Seaside, Gearhart and Cannon Beach.

If the measure is approved, the levy will be renewed at the same rate for the next five years, starting with school year 2016-17. Residents will not see an increase because of the local option tax.

An electrical fire broke out in the basement of Gimre's Shoe Store on Friday, causing thick smoke to issue from beneath the sidewalk vents and a minor power outage.

Astoria Fire Department was dispatched at 11:30 a.m. and requested assistance from neighboring fire crews. Medix and Pacific Power also arrived on scene. The fire was declared under control at 12:17 p.m. No injuries were reported.

"It really wasn't a large fire to speak of," Astoria Fire Chief Ted Ames said. "It had the potential to be, but it wasn't.'

Asked if the fire could have been human-caused, Ames said, "No. I mean, Lord knows, but, no, I don't think so."

The smoke was first spotted coming from a storefront vent by a neighboring business owner, who alerted Pete Gimre,

the owner of Gimre's on 14th Street

Ames did not offer an estimate of the damage but said the fire didn't damage Gimre's or the adjoining businesses. While some smoke poured into Gimre's, Ames said he doubts the shoe store will lose any inven-

"It could have been a lot worse, I can tell you that," Ames said. "But everybody kept a level head, and things worked out."

The store was open regular hours Saturday.
