Narrow win sends Fishermen to state

The South Umpqua and Astoria football teams battled hard for 47 minutes, 48 seconds Friday night at CMH Field.

And it all came down to one 32-yard field goal attempt by the Lancers with 12 seconds left.

The result? The Fishermen left the field with their first playoff victory in five years, 7-6, while South Umpqua is now 0-2 in Playin games on the North Coast over the last three years.

Jaret Remington's late field goal attempt had the distance, but it drifted wide right, and Astoria moves on to the sweet 16 for the first time since 2010.

"I didn't know," Astoria coach Howard Rub said Remington's field goal attempt. "From my angle, it looked like it had a 50-50 chance to sneak inside the post. The snap was a little high and (the kick) got pushed. His head went down right away, and that was an indicator that he missed. It was close. Really close."

Outgained by a wide margin, the Fishermen spent much of the night trying to stop a tough Lancer offense.

South Umpqua rolled up 356 yards in total offense and 20 first downs, to Astoria's 206 yards and 11 first downs.

But, as so often happens, playoff football comes down to turnovers and penalties. And that's where the Lancers lost it.

South Umpqua — which lost a 2013 Regional Play-in game at Seaside, 50-47 finished with three crucial turnovers, and the Lancers were penalized six times for 60 yards.

Friday's game lasted just under two hours.

Each team had only three offensive possessions in the first half, Astoria had just three first downs in the second half, to South Umpqua's


not much better the second half," Rub said. "We're disappointed that we didn't finish some drives and execute some drives, but it was just that kind of night. They were in the same boat. They can be a pretty explosive offense at times.

"If you win the turnover battle and play solid defense, you give yourself a chance," he said. "Between the weather and the fact the teams were evenly matched in a lot of different areas, just made it that type of game."

Astoria's lone scoring drive of the night came midway through the first half.

After stopping the Lancers on downs, the Fishermen took over and drove 63 vards in 10 plays, capped by an 8-yard scoring run from Carter Wallace with 9:19 left in the second quarter. Andrew Schauermann added what turned out to be the game-winning point, and Astoria had a 7-0 lead at halftime.

Meanwhile, the Lancers' opening drive of the game ended with a lost fumble

at the Astoria 18-yard line; and South Umpqua's third possession of the first half reached the Astoria 23, before the Lancers were flagged for an unsportsmanlike conduct, followed on the next play by an interception from Fishermen junior Ryan Palek.

"The turnover on their opening drive was huge,"

Rub said. "They put together a pretty good drive, and it was big to get the turnover and turn it around.

"The one drive we mounted in the first half was good. We executed a play on fourth down and did a lot more positive things than negative."

After back-to-back interceptions midway through the second half, the Lancers drove 53 yards in nine plays, with Shawn Rigsby scoring on a sweep from 1-yard out. The snap from center on the point-after attempt was dropped, and the Fishermen kept a 7-6 lead.


Astoria's best drive of the second half was its first drive, when the Fishermen marched 29 yards to the Lancer 46-yard line, before turning the ball over on downs. That was as far as the Astoria offense would get in the second half.

South Umpqua's last possession started at its own 11yard line, with 1:46 left and no timeouts.

Two Nathan Thompson-to-Tristin Gross pass completions moved the ball to the Astoria 30, and a face mask penalty on the Fishermen later in the drive moved it to the Fishermen 15 with 22 seconds left.

Thompson threw an incomplete pass on third down. and Remington missed the fourth down field goal attempt.

South Umpqua's Kyler Merritt rushed for 110 yards

on 22 carries, while Wallace finished with 119 yards on 28 attempts.

"You can't say enough about the character of the kids to win a game like this," Rub said. "On both sides. The South Umpqua kids played their hearts out. It was what you would expect from a Play-in game of some evenly matched teams."


With starting quarterback Fridtjof Fremstad out with a separated shoulder, the Fishermen will go with Ryker Helmersen through the rest of the playoffs.

"We didn't throw down field a lot, but Ryker did a great job and actually had a couple great audibles in our run game that made some big plays," Rub said.
"Clay (Englund) and Car-

ter did a great job on both sides of the ball tonight," he added. "Ryan Palek had a nice night, Samboy Tuimato played really well, and up front in general our offensive line did a decent job."

After the game, Rub said he was "99 percent sure" Astoria's next opponent would be Mazama (winners of seven in a row), but instead, the Fishermen will travel Friday to North Bend, where Astoria defeated the defending state champion Bulldogs 22-20 Sept. 11.

The winner will play either North Marion or Sisters.
