State attorneys begin Trump pushback

Washington state first to file over immigration

SEATTLE — Washington became the first state to sue the Trump administration with a filing Monday over the president's executive order restricting refugees and immigration. It won't be standing alone for long.

Since Donald Trump was elected president, Democratic state attorneys general have been forming a coordinated wall of legal resistance over immigration, environmental protections, health care, and other major issues.

"It's my responsibility as attorney general to defend the rule of law, to uphold the Constitution on behalf of the people of this state. And that's what we're doing,' Washington Attorney General Bob Ferguson said.

New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman told The Associated Press that lawyers, including attor-

neys general, are having an "awakening" regarding the Trump administration.

"This is a president who does not have respect for the rule of the law," he said. "That's something that bothers a lot of people.

Schneiderman given model legislation to local governments in New York showing them how to become sanctuary cities that would refuse to cooperate with federal authorities on some immigration enforcement matters.

The lawsuits were discussed as the fight over the president's executive order on immigration escalated in Washington, D.C.

Accusing her of betrayal and insubordination, Trump on Monday fired Sally Yates, the acting attorney general of the United States and a

Democratic appointee, after she publicly questioned the constitutionality of the refugee and immigration ban and refused to defend it in court.


The dramatic public clash between the new president and the nation's top law enforcement officer laid bare the growing discord and dissent surrounding Trump's executive order, which temporarily halted the entire U.S. refugee program and banned all entries from seven Muslim-majority nations for 90

The firing came hours after Yates directed Justice Department attorneys not to defend the executive order, saying she was not convinced it was lawful or consistent with the agency's obligation "to stand for what is right." Trump accused Yates of having "betrayed the Department of Justice by refusing to enforce a legal order designed to protect the citizens of the United States."

He immediately named longtime federal prosecutor Dana Boente, the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, as Yates' replacement.

Boente said Trump's executive order was "both lawful on its face and properly drafted."
