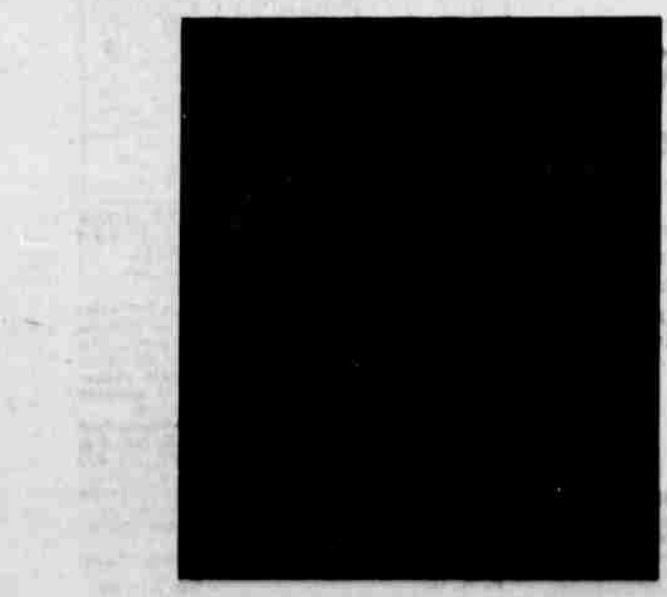

- 1014—Battle of Clontarf, Ireland.
- 1340—Order of the Garter instituted by Edward III.
- 1500—Brazil discovered by Pedro Alvarez Cabral.
- 1600—Accession of King Henry VIII. of England.
- 1534—Elizabeth Barton, "Maid of Kent," executed.
- 1545—The mines of Potosi opened.
- 1570—Hammond burned for heresy at Norwich, England.
- 1620—San Salvador, Brazil, surrendered by the Dutch to the Portuguese.
- 1045—Cromwell defeated the King's forces at Islip Bridge.

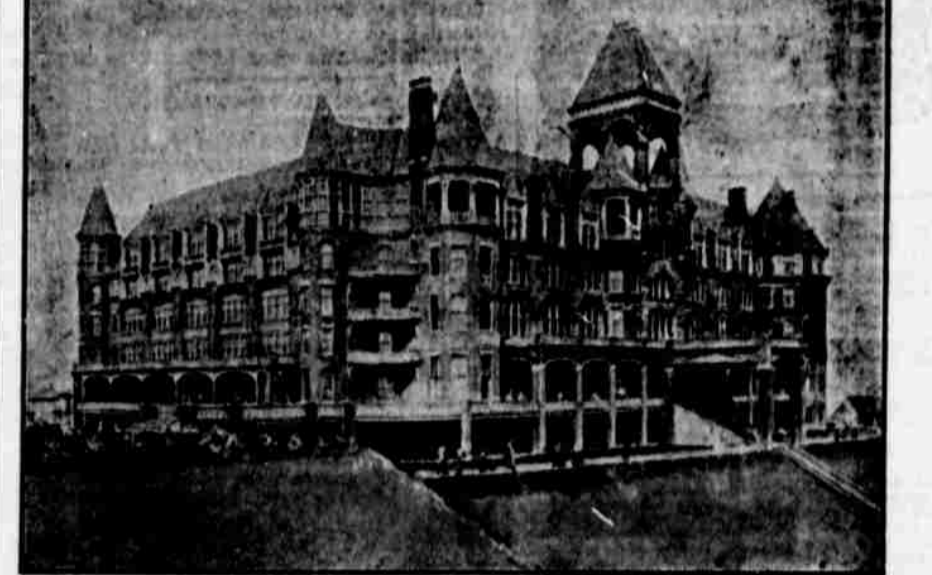
