

LOGAN STATUE UNVEILED

WASHINGTON'S FINE EQUESTRIAN FIGURE OF "BLACK JACK."

Ceremonies Conducted in the Presence of the President, His Cabinet and Widows of Famous Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The heroic bronze equestrian statue of Major-General John A. Logan, which rests on an imposing bronze pedestal in Iowa Circle, was unveiled today in the presence of the President, the Cabinet, the widows and relatives of the gallant soldier, many of his comrades-in-arms and a vast multitude of people.

BOER CAPITAL TAKEN

PLUMER OCCUPIED PIETERSBURG WITH SLIGHT OPPOSITION.

Big Supply of Ammunition Found in the Dutch Magazine—English Control the Railway.

LONDON, April 9.—Lord Kitchener, reporting to the war office, under date of Pretoria, April 8, says: "Plumer has occupied Pietersburg with slight opposition. He captured two locomotives and forty-nine trucks. He took sixty prisoners, capturing a seven-pounder and destroying 200,000 cartridges with rounds of seven-pounder ammunition and a considerable amount of powder and dynamite."

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GRIEVANCES OF CHINA.

For Years She Has Been Bullied by the European Powers.

CHICAGO, April 8.—President Angell, in the course of his speech here tonight, referred to China and declared that in his opinion the Administration of President McKinley in dealing in China "has been following the same wise, magnanimous and noble policy which General Grant himself would have followed if he had been President of the United States."

GRAND DUKE IS OF AGE

ACCESSION OF THE NEW RULER OF MECKLENBURG-SCHWERIN.

Frederick Frans, the Fourth, Made His State Entry into His Capital—Other Foreign News.

SCHWERIN, April 9.—The Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Frederick Frans IV, who attained his majority today, has invoked the assistance of the Emperor. The weather was magnificent. His royal highness was received at the railroad station by Grand Duke Johan Albrecht, his uncle, who has been regent of the grand duchy since the death of his father during his minority, and by a number of princely guests.

THE PLAGUE IN AFRICA.

She was an active Democratic worker during the campaign preceding the city election.

PORTO RICANS PETITION MCKINLEY.

NEW YORK, April 9.—Santiago Iglesias, delegate to the Federation of Labor of Porto Rico, who arrived on the steamer Ponce from San Juan, is the bearer of a petition from the workmen of Porto Rico to President McKinley. The petition, which bears 800 signatures, the Porto Ricans say: "Misery with all its horrible consequences is spreading in our homes."

TEA MERCHANT'S MONEY.

Further Proceedings in the Gilman Will Contest.

NEW YORK, April 9.—Justice Truxin, in the Supreme Court, today granted an application by the Fifth Avenue Trust Company, which corporation is the defendant in the will contest, against it by Mrs. Helen Gilman to recover \$14,100 deposited by the late George Gilman during the year 1890, to turn over the money to Theophilus Gilman and Edward F. Norton, the temporary administrators of the Gilman estate.

German Indemnity Claims.

BERLIN, April 9.—It is officially reported that while Dr. Steubel, of the Colonial Department of the German Foreign Office, was in London a mutual agreement was reached between Germany and Great Britain regarding Germany's claims to indemnity for Germans evicted from the Transvaal.

Robbery on a Steamship.

CHEERBOURG, France, April 10.—On the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse yesterday, from New York, it was announced that three gold bars, worth \$4000 each, had been stolen during the voyage.

Riots Caused by a Drama.

NEW YORK, April 9.—A special to the Herald from Buenos Ayres says: "Serious anti-clerical riots have occurred at San Pablo, State of Santiago del Estero. They were caused by the production of the Spanish drama, 'Electra,' which recently caused disturbances in Spain. There was great excitement during the performance, and at the end the audience rushed out and marched through the streets uttering cries against the clergy. They marched to the convent of San Benito and stoned it. The police finally dispersed the rioters and arrested many of them."

Chicago Wants Olympian Games.

CHICAGO, April 9.—Henry J. Fuhrer, Jr., of the committee on prospects, that is urging Chicago as a place for the Olympian games in 1904, today received a letter from Paris announcing that President Loubet, of France, had accepted the proposal. The Olympian games committee, would personally preside at the meeting in Paris May 19 to determine where the next year's Olympic games should be held.

English Takes the Place of French.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Emperor William has decreed that the English language shall take the place of French in the school of the German Empire, according to a communication received at the State Department from Consul-General Gunther, at Frankfurt. The French language hereafter will be an optional study.

Emperor William's Assault.

BERLIN, April 10.—Dietrich Welland, of Bremen, who is now in an insane asylum, has suffered several severe epileptic attacks. In one of these he almost killed the counsel retained for his defense.

Condition of the French Premier.

PARIS, April 9.—Waldeck-Rousseau, the Premier, passed a good night. His condition is excellent, and his rapid recovery is anticipated.
