CROCKER THE MAN

To Be Foster's Choice for Washington Collectorship.

WILSON FAVORS MARSHAL IDE

Test of Strength to Be Made Between Senator and Ex-Senator—Wilson Is Now East, Presumably Consulting President.

His selection by Senator Foster will immediately raise the issue of whether the Senator himself or John L. Wilson, the most influential at Washington City. The Wilson faction all over the state, taking the cue apparently from the Senator, are all for Foster.

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Should the President turn him down, and announce his intention to defer solely to the wishes of Senator Foster, the collector of Washington patronage, it will be a serious blow to the Wilson machine.
