A speculator obtained \$5000 from the Government and then sublet the contract. This was for a continuous mail service every 24 hours, and could not be accomplished. The sub-contractor became weary and gave up in despair. The Government then fell back on the speculator and his bond for \$50,000. He wanted to draw down his bond, but was not permitted to do so. The Government is now operating the route at a cost of \$5000 a year and taking the money out of the speculator's bond. The increase in the weight of the mail has much to do with the losses sustained.
