Jobbers Dispose of Over 100,000 Pounds Poultry.

A WIDE RANGE FOR TURKEYS

Many Consignments Sent in Too Late for Thanksgiving Trade-Large Proportion of Culls-The Sugar Situation.

With the close of buriness in the jobbing district yesterday, it was estimated that from of. Enough other poultry and game changed hands to raise the quantity well above 100,000 pounds. On the whole, the Thanksriving trade was good, but there was the usual complaint of late consignments. While some of the dealers cleaned up, others did not fare so well. Many growers and merchants in the country put off their shipments until the last moment not realizing that the fowls should be here at least two days before the holiday.

The quality of the turkeys received was not uniform, as is shown by the scale of prices ealized. The best sold readily at 20c, but poor stock ranged down as low as 10c per po-The quantity received was about equal to the demand, though more good turkeys could have been sold. The poorer lots were in abundance, and it was only by dropping the quotation that they were worked off. As to the cause of so many poor birds coming in this year, no one appears to know exactly, but many poultrymen attribute it to the late Spring. Very few live turkeys were received during the past few days, but what came in sold easily at 13615c.

Manhattan Extensively Traded In on Announcement of Interborough Lease-Trading Professional.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.-With few exceptions NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—With few exceptions, today was virtually a repetition of the first days of the week. As on the previous day, the move in Manhaftan brought slight improvement elsewhere in the list, but the raily harely covered initial losses, save in St. Paul and Reading. The market became duller and irregular, with operations altogether professional. Colorado Fuel, after a further gain of a point, reacted by per cent and closed unchanged.
