

WILL TEL STORY Saxon King Does Not Spare the Princess.

HE DENIES ANY ILLTREATMENT

He Declares Love for Giron Her Sole Reason for Elopement—She Says She Loves the Frenchman Alone

BERLIN, Dec. 30.—King George of Saxony has ordered the preparation of a full official account of the elopement of the Crown Princess Louise and the circumstances leading up to it for the Saxons, among whom the most fantastical stories are in circulation to the detriment of the royal people, especially with reference to the future King. The scandal is underdetermined, according to some opinions, the people's loyalty and respect for the throne. The dynasty being Catholic and the people Protestant, the affair is being utilized for sectarian controversy.

More Warships for Germany. EXTENSIVE PROGRAMME OF CONSTRUCTION FOR THE COMING YEAR. BERLIN, Dec. 30.—The naval budget for 1903 provides for laying down immediately two battle-ships, one armored cruiser, two small cruisers and five torpedo boats.

ROME, Dec. 30.—Cardinal Vannutelli, president of the apostolic bureau, which deals with matrimonial questions, is authorized for the statement that the pope could not, under any circumstances, annul the marriage of the Crown Prince of Saxony.

Court to Try Divorce Suit. DRESDEN, Dec. 30.—King George has appointed a special court of seven judges to try the suit for divorce which the Crown Princess has decided to institute against the Crown Prince.

TWINS CANNOT AGREE. Premiers of Austria and Hungary at Issue on Finances. VIENNA, Dec. 30.—The Austrian Premier, Dr. von Koerber, was received in audience by Emperor Francis Joseph today and tendered his resignation, but His Majesty declined to accept it.

German Catholics' Claims. ROME, Dec. 30.—Herr P. Cahenaly, a member of the German Reichstag and president of the Saint Raphael Society in America, who for 10 years has been agitating in favor of the appointment of German ecclesiastics to minister to German Catholics in the United States, is again actively urging the Vatican to appoint German bishops wherever the German element predominates.

Safe and Sure. COPENHAGEN, Dec. 30.—Many Swedish towns, especially Lalmo, Hamstead and Marstrand, have been severely damaged by the recent storms. Many persons have been drowned. Three Russian and hundreds of Scandinavian vessels have been wrecked.

Per Relief of Earthquake Victims. PARIS, Dec. 30.—President Loubet has sent \$200 for the relief of the sufferers from the earthquake at Andjian, Russian Turkistan.
