CHICAGO, Jan. 5 .- The directorate of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association held a meeting today to consider the advisability of instituting criminal pro-ceedings against the coal dealers and coal-carrying railroads, charged with being responsible for the present fuel fam-ine. Evidence gathered by the various members of the organization for a fortnight, which is said to prove the exist-ence of a conspiracy to extort high prices from consumers, was considered at length, and the conference resulted in the appointment of a committee with instructions to continue the investigation and report at a future meeting.
