Other interests are reported offering on the same basis. The association's agents report slower confirmations of corders on pink futures at 50c f. a. b. basis, Spot pink offers at 285 for a sholder. A little movement in fancy chinook fish is reported at \$1.60 for tails, \$1.60% for flat, and \$5c for halves. Red Alaska is quiet.

California mail advices say of asparagus; If immediate measures are not taken to stop the ravages of rust in the asparagus fields around Migitus the entire asparagus industry of the state will be destroyed. Horticulturist A. V. Steubenrasch, of the State University, hat been examining the disease for several days, and reports that 150 acres are siready doomed, and that all the surrounding region, comprising some 500 acres is threatened. This one section produced \$100,000 worth of asparagus last year. The industry had to be given up in the East on account of this destructive fungus, and as the disease has a hold in Call-fornia, the university fornia the university experts may not be able to stay its ravages.


