Trade the past three months for beans has sen very heavy, most all points in the United ates drawing on California for supplies. This is due to the shortage of the Michigan and New York crops. Michigan dealers claim there are only 600 cars in the state, against the usual supply at this time of the year, of about 2000 cars. The largest trade that California has is from March to November. CAUSES BEAVY SELLING MOVE-MENT IN NEW YORK STOCKS.

Lively Rally Near the Close Is Not Supported-Week's Currency Movement.

NEW YORK, April 8.—There was another heavy selling movement in the stock market this morning, which apparently overreached the mark, judging from the scramble of shorts to cover during the last hour, when the supply of stocks had become scarce. This led to a lively rally and a general recovery of prices to above last night's level. The rally was not well held, however, owing to the evidence of renewed realizing for the satisfaction of the snore urgent demand from shorts. As a result, the closing was easy and below the top level of the rally. The appreciable relaxation of the tension in the money market and a bellef that the factors at work would bring still further relief next week were the dominant influences in the rally.

The morning selling was due to the had effect of a violent break in Southern Pacific to 55%, which aroused fears for the position of the pool. The apparently endiess stream of liquida-

pool. The apparently endiess stream of liquida-tion in Pennsylvania was also turned into the tion in Pennsylvania was also turned into the market afresh, carrying the price to a new level on the movement, at 155. The Friday requirements in the money market kept up the call money rate early in the day, and there were appearances to warrant the assumption that the hanks were assuming an admonitory attitude toward the speculative pools in a way which might account for some of the selling. The extreme point which has been reached to the personal antipathy growing out of the Southern Pacific quarrel gives color to the report that the weapons employed extend to the influencing of the supply of financial resources employed by the pool in the stock market.

The fact that the Southern Pacific books closed tenight for the annual meeting indicates the closing of the struggle for representation at that meeting. The demand for the stock is likely to be affected as a consequence. Its movement became very feverish in the dealings during the rally in the market, and on its rise to the stock of these were several wide rotes changes. during the rally in the market, and on its rise to 60%, there were several wide price changes. A rumor found currency at the same time that a prominent financier whose services have been called upon to settle more than one threatened financial context had been induced to adjust the differences among the Southern Pacific shareholders. The reversite collapse in the stock sufficiently indicated the skepticism with which this rumor was received in the early decline.

Amalgamated Copper weakened on the simple in the London copper market and a further offering down of the metal on the local metal exchange. Colorado Fuel extended its recent decline. The weakness of Sugar was attributed to unsettled trade conditions.

The preliminary estimate of the week's currency movement indicates a small gain on balance from the interior, but the loss to the Subtreasury of \$1,567,000 and a shipment of \$250,000 in gold to Canada promises to bring the net decrease in cash to over \$1,500,000. The calling of loans incident to the April 1 settlement will greatly confuse the showing of that item. The confidence that the usual seasonable factors are at work for the replenishment of the local money market, however, overshadows the influence of the immediate showing of the banks.

SEASONABLE DECREASE SHOWN BY DUN'S INDEX NUMBER.

Effect of Floods at Mississippi Valley Points-The Industries Are Active.

NEW YORK April 3.—R. G. Dun's weekly review of trade tomorrow will say:
Another week of good weather has brought out a large volume of business, many manufacturers receiving urgent requests for immediate shipments. Ploods have caused serious losses at a few points on the Missistippi, and traffic was interrupted on railways in that vicinity, but on the whole the freight situation is more satisfactory than at any previous tithe this year. Quicker transportation has relieved the fuel pressure, and the industrial situation would be unprecedentedly invorable were it not for the prevalence of labor disputes. Railway samings in March increased 13 per cent over last year, and 21.1 per cent as compared with 1901.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—(Special.)—A squeeze in May barley was the feature of the grain market. Spot wheat was firm and futures easier. Peed oats have a firmer tendemory. Bran is quiet and steady, with light arrivals.

Receipts of oranges were very light, and only four carioads are on the way from the south. Choice and fancy navels of medium size are selling readily at good prices. Large sizes are rather slow. Only one carload, all standards, was offered at auction, better grades being scarce. Lemons are plentiful and unchanged. Mexican limes are well cleaned up and firm. A steamer with moderate supplies is doe, but not yet arrived. Bananas are firmer for choice offerings. The first strawberries of the season arrived and brought fance on account of the recent cold weather. Apples are slow and easy.

Old potatoes are quiet and unchanged. New potatoes are scarce. A carload of fair quality sweets brought \$1.75. Onlone are dragging. Receipts of asparagus were light and prices higher, as much of the crop is now going to canneries. Rhisbarb and peas were in excessive supply and lower. Some Florida tomatoes arrived and sold high. Other garden truck was scarce.

like weather, and jobbers report reorders from retailers increasing, while collections show im-provement. Some price revisions are to be noted, particularly in coal, pig fron, copper, coffee and sugar on the Atlantic seaboard. Flour is slightly higher on the excellent ex-nort business.

The industries, particularly fron and steel and lumber, are active the country over. The Spring crop of strikes is equal to the average, though most of them have appeared a trifle earlier, particularly in the building trades. The activity in lumber is a notable feature just now, the only complaint being not enough deliveries to meet the current demand. Show manufacturing is in rather better shape than previously. The pressure of foreign fron at Eastern seaboard markets is the reason assigned for the cut of \$1\$ per ton in Southern foundry grades, and for the sympathetic weakening of \$50c, per ton in other kinds of pig iron at Eastern markets.

Anthracite coal has experienced the usual Spring cut of 50c per ton, but the level is still 40c per ton higher than a year ago at this time, showing that the consumer in this line has had to pay the expense of last year's great strike.
