These two chief commercial classes make a runch better exhibit than last year's figures; but in the less important third division, embracing brokers, transporters, etc., liabilities were \$4.782,779, against \$3,438,527 year ago, a considerably heavier percentage increase than appears elsewhere, although in number there was a decrease of 4 to 166. 
