

TO PROVE BRIBERY

Illinois House Insists on Miller's Evidence.

COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE

Anti-Miller Forces Oppose Further Action on Traction Bills Until It Has Reported—They Add Own Men to Committee.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 24.—The Illinois House of Representatives today by a vote of 73 to 60, declared "no confidence" in its presiding officer, Speaker John H. Miller, whose alleged unwarranted use of the gavel in furthering the proposed enactment affecting street railway franchises in Chicago led to a riot yesterday.

The anti-Miller men came to the hall today determined to force the Speaker to prove his charges or withdraw them. If he could not resist by a majority vote, they had decided that no business should be transacted in the House until he had complied with their demand.

Calvin Follows Storm. The opening of the session this morning was a calm after the storm yesterday, although there was a decided undercurrent of feeling against Speaker Miller which threatened to break out again if anything similar to the tactics of yesterday was attempted.

Plains of Anti-Miller Men. Before Mr. Lindley called up his bill a conference of those friendly to the Muller bill was held in the hall, at which it was decided to insist upon having all amendments stripped from the Lindley bill.

Members of the committee this morning, and none of his followers would give out the names if they knew them. The members opposed in such a way that they did not believe there was anything in the charges made by the Speaker, and announced their intention of pushing the matter in such a way that he would be compelled to prove his assertion or admit that he could not make it good.

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HE THEN SUBMITTED A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR AN INVESTIGATION OF THE CHARGES MADE BY GEORGE W. HINMAN, OF CHICAGO, AND PUBLISHED IN THE INTER-OCEAN.

The resolution, which calls for Mr. Hinman's presence in the House not later than Tuesday, was adopted by a majority of eight members being absent or not voting.

Another Slip at Miller. The fact that Speaker Miller failed to appoint a member of the committee Mr. Hinaker, who on Thursday moved the appointment of the committee, stirred the anti-Miller people to wrath, and Clarence Cook, member of the committee, moved that the committee be increased to 11, and that Representatives Hinaker, McKinley, Trautmann, Bundy, Shurtliff and McManis be named as members.

Will Visit the Pope. King Edward Makes Plans and Leo Ignores Petty Details. ROME, April 24.—Great satisfaction is felt at the Vatican at the official announcement that King Edward will visit the pope, although some arrangement by which the British sovereign would not have to start from the Embassy for the Vatican would have been preferred.

Expelled from Germany. Berlin, April 24.—The governments of Prussia and of the Grand Duchy of Mecklenburg have decided to expel the Mormon missionaries, of whom there are 146 in Germany and 50 in Prussia, on the ground that they are propagating a form of religious belief incompatible with the laws of state and public morals, and because polygamy is not excluded from their doctrine.

Murder by Naval Cadet. Reichstag Wrought Up by Details of Hartmann's Death. BERLIN, April 24.—The government was interpellated by members of the Center party regarding the killing of an artillery lieutenant, Hans Hartmann, by a German cadet, Adolf Huserer, at Essen on Good Friday last, because the former did not salute the latter properly.

Accept the Land Bill. DUBLIN, April 24.—At the session here today of the Irish Landowners' Convention, at which the Duke of Abercorn presided, the following resolution was passed: "While the provisions of the land bill fall short of the views previously recorded by this convention, it is desirable that all parties in Ireland accept the principles of the bill and assist the government to pass the measure, which will go further to solve the land question than any previous bill."

Committee to Amend Land Bill. LONDON, April 24.—A meeting of Nationalists members of Parliament in the House of Commons today appointed a committee to draft amendments to the Irish land bill in accordance with the resolutions of the Dublin Nationalist convention. John Redmond is chairman of the committee.

Alphonso Receives the Doctors. MADRID, April 24.—The delegates to the International Medical Congress were received this evening. The reception was a brilliant function. The delegates were presented to King Alphonso by the Ambassadors and Ministers of their respective countries.

British Royal Commission. LONDON, April 24.—The royal commission for the St. Louis Exposition was gazetted today. The Prince of Wales is president and Viscount Peel is chairman. There are 15 other members.

Cuban Commission to Fair. HAVANA, April 24.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Foot-Sterling has been appointed a Commissioner to the St. Louis Exposition.

General Maximo Gomez and Senator Foot-Sterling will leave here tomorrow for Washington, where they will meet Minister Quesada. From Washington the party will go to St. Louis.
