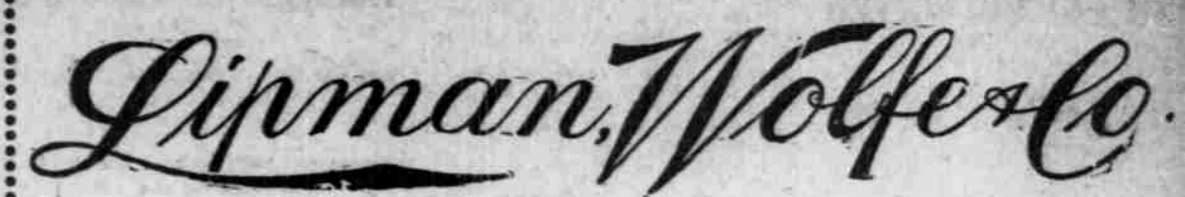

MATOS HAS A LARGE FORCE

REVOLUTIONARY LEADER LANDS ON VENEZUELAN COAST.

His Purpose Is to Attack Caracas, After Joining With General Bolando.

WILLEMSTADT, Island of Curacao, Wednesday, April 26.—General Matos, the leader of the Venezuelan revolution, left this island last Sunday and landed the following night on the Venezuelan coast.

The recent defeat in the Rio Chico district of the Government Generals, Gomez and Ferrer, at the hands of the revolutionists under General Bolando, has been fully confirmed. The government forces are said to have been completely annihilated.

ALL Quiet in Santo Domingo. SANTO DOMINGO, Wednesday, April 23.—The German gunboat Panther left here this morning for San Pedro de Macoris.

Sanita Maria Threatens. GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala, May 1.—Heavy shelling has been directed recently in the direction of Santa Maria volcano, but particularly on Thursday night. It is believed here that the volcano has again erupted.

PARISIANS CHEER HIM. King Edward Greeted on His Way to Church.

PARIS, May 1.—The picturesque feature of King Edward's visit to Paris are practically over. The incidents of today were comparatively quiet, but they were still expressive of the renewal of the Anglo-French good will.

At noon today Foreign Minister Delcasse gave a breakfast at the Foreign Office to His Majesty. Among the hundreds present were many notable figures in official and diplomatic circles, as well as persons famous in the salons.

the King and M. Delcasse, the papal nuncio, and Count von Wolkstein, the Austrian Ambassador, who in dean of the diplomatic corps.

This afternoon King Edward planted a chestnut tree in the garden of the British Embassy, in commemoration of his visit, and received the orphaned pensioners of the British institution, the cornerstone of which he laid when he was Prince of Wales.

At a private conference between King Edward and M. Delcasse, following the breakfast, his majesty expressed his appreciation of the friendly attitude of the government and people and reiterated the hope that his visit would have a salutary influence on the relations of the two governments.

The decoration of a number of French officials by King Edward is announced. The members of the King's party have received the decoration of the Order of the Legion of Honor.

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The press unites in attributing much significance to the unusual exchanges of good will of the last three days and declares that lingering animosities have been eradicated.

Although it is raining tonight, the King's presence in Paris continues to be celebrated with open-air balls and street festivities. No toasts were proposed at the dinner given tonight at the embassy by King Edward to President Loubet.

President Loubet—I thank you cordially for your visit and for this manifestation of the friendly relations which so happily exist between our two peoples and which becomes still more close for the development of so many common interests and the peace of the world.

In reply, King Edward said: I have received at the hands of yourself, the French government and the French people. I am happy on this occasion, which will tighten the bonds of friendship to contribute to the approach of our two countries and their common interests.

MOUNTAIN IS CRUMBLING

PROPERTY IS BEING MOVED AWAY WITH ALL SPEED.

Little Signs of Life About the Place—No Chances Will Be Taken by Inhabitants.

BLAIRMORE, N. W. T. May 1.—The loud reports caused by the limestone crumbling and falling down the mountain, which kept up the greater part of today, ceased about 10 o'clock.

Another party ascended the mountain today to observe the progress of disintegration going on in the danger zone. It was found that the break or crevice from which future trouble is looked for has widened greatly since the observations of the day before.
