#### MATOS HAS A LARGE FORCE

REVOLUTIONARY LEADER LANDS ON VENEZUELAN COAST.

His Purpose Is to Attack Caracas,

WILLEMSTADT, Island of Curacao, Wednesday, April 29.-General Matos, the leader of the Venezuelan revolution, left this island last Sunday and landed the following night on the Venezuelan coast. He proceeded overland to Barquisimeto. where he assumed command of a large revolutionary force. He will march inland, and in conjunction with General Ro-lando he purposes to commence opera-tions against Caracas.

The recent defeat in the Rio Chico district of the Government Generals, Gomes and Ferrer, at the hands of the revolu-tionists under General Rolando, has been fully confirmed.
