WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

Loss Through Exports Offset by Recelpts From the Interfor.

NEW YORK, May 20.—The Pinancier this week says: The striking feature of the official statement of the New York banks last week was the simost unprecedented slight change of \$40,100 in the net cash, notwithstanding the less during the week, through exports of gold to South America and to Europe of \$4,402,000. This would seem to show that the loss through gold shipments was offset by cash receipts from the interfor. The loans were decreased \$481,200, which may be regarded as a very small contraction, considering the heavy liquidation in the stock market during the greater part of the week. The specie was decreased \$1,806,200 while the legal tenders were increased \$2,025,300, making the net gain in cash \$40,100. Deposits were reduced \$1,320,300, and the required reserve was thereby lessened by \$382,325; adding to this sum the net gain of \$40,100 in cash, as above, makes an increase of \$422,425 in surplus reserve, which is now \$5,445,100 circust.

this sum the net gain of \$40,100 in cash, as above, makes an increase of \$422,425 in surplus reserve, which is now \$5,645,150. Calculated on the basis of deposits, less those of \$37,248,400 of Covernment funds, the surplus reserve is \$18,057,250.

The statement was most likely made up on declining averages for cash, for in addition to the \$500,000 average loss of gold resulting, there was a withdrawal of \$750,000 Thursday for export to Canada. The circulation was decreased \$30,700 and the average daily clearings were \$213,000,000. With money ruling at low rates at call and with such a congestion of funds at this center fis now exists, the condition of the banks may be regarded as a matter of little concern.
