### **SAY IT IS NONE OF HIS BUSINESS**

**Buit Brought Against Alleged Trust** Is Declared by Its Attorneys to Be Incompetent-Court Takes Matter Under Advisement.

In the suit of W. E. Jenkins against Imman, Poulsen & Co., North Pacific Lumber Company and others, comprising the City Retail Lumber Company, a mo-tion that the complaint be made more was argued yesterday before

Judge Frazer. The attorney for the defense wants Jenkins to specify particularly in what manner he has been discriminated against by alleged lumber combine; what conces he has lost; what contracts he has tracts he has lost; what contracts he has suffered loss on because of the acts of the City Retail Lumber Company; what the prices were before July, 1992, and what the prices have been since that are alleged to have been unreasonable and ex-cessive. Specific allegations were asked coerning many other things set forth the complaint. Counsel insisted that from that of the general public. He must show that he is affected and discriminated against differently to 360 other contract-ers. Continuing, the attorney said: "He says his business is ruined; that he has four or five contracts he cannot complete; and in another place that he has been re-fused lumber altogether; also that he is charged more than members of the Mas-ter Bullders' Association, because he em-

ploys union labor." by union labor."

commenting on all these allegations, unsel asserted that they were entitled particulars, so as to know what to st. The attorney wanted to know the count of lumber Jenkins had purchased. and what particular building he is en-gaged in constructing; what he paid for lumber in July, 1902, and what he pays new. Many other specific allegations were demanded; and the assertion was made that Jenkins must show a particu-lar injury within the purview of the law to be entitled to maintain a suit at all.

Counsel for Jenkins argued that it was sufficient for his client to show a gen-eral injury to his contracting business. He alleged that he had to charge customers more because prices were arbi-trarily advanced, and consequently lost business. The ultimate fact that prices were unreasonable was sufficient. Jenkins alleged that the defendants sold only through one corporation, the City Retail imber Company; the prices were fixed themselves, were within their own sowiedge, and did not have to be stated in the complaint. The same was true as to what lumber was bought. The defend-ants knew what they had sold him, and ne could not buy anywhere else.

The attorney argued that the members of the Master Bullders' Association were mderbid Jenkins on contracts. It could be proved by dozens of witnesses that the Master Builders receive 5 per cent rebate every six months from the City Retsil Company on all lumber pur

The injury continues," cour "so long as Jenkins refuses to join their association and employ such men as they The lumber mills have taken the part of the Master Builders against union men, and this contractor has suffered. Alexander Bernstein, counsel for the petitioner, consented to the postponement with the understanding that Mr. and Mrs. Leppere would promise not to remove the children beyond the jurisdiction of the

Mr. Seton assured the court that there was no danger at all of their being taken away. Mr. Leppers is employed by the Western Union Telegraph Company, and owns his own home at Mount Tabor. The children were brought into court to show good faith, and the mother and steplather

good faith, and the mother and steplather are willing to meet the case.

The petition filed by Neille Wiersum recites that Winifred Leppere, formerly Winifred Wiersum, was granted a divorce from Henry Wiersum on March II, 1962. She was granted \$15 per month allmony for the support of the chiliten surmony for the support of the children dur ing their minority, and was to take then to her home. On August 6, 1962, this decrement of allmony was to cease, and the father was granted the custody of the children on Saturday and Sunday, ex-cept if they were sick, and during school vacation. It was decreed that the mother should reside in Milwaukee. In the No-vember following, the decree was again modified to give the father the absolute care of the children. Soon afterward Mrs. Leppero came to Portland with her offpring, and it is charged in the petition that in so doing she is guilty of con-tempt, because she disobeyed the order of the Milwaukee court and carried the mildren beyond its jurisdiction

AWARDED BIG DAMAGES. Mining Company Must Pay an Em ploye for Broken Hip.

A verdict for \$5000 damages was returned in the Federal Court yesterday by the jury in the case of Charles P. Jones against the Bunker Hill Mining & Con-centrating Company. Jones sued for \$20,-309 Gamages on account of injuries sus-tained by five tons of ore falling upon him. His leg was broken near the hip joint, and he restified that the injuries he received caused atrophy of the nerves. Jones is a miner, and is a man of intelligence. His statement of the cause of the cence. His statement of the cause of the excident was convincing. He asserted that the company in the floor above where he was employed mined beyond the safe limit, and drilled a hole downward, with the result that the rock fell from underneath, and struck him where he was in the chamber below. He said that after the accident, in coming up he saw the upper chamber and observed what had taken place.

The defense was that the fall of rock was not brought about in this manner nor from the place designated by Jones, but was occasioned by Jones drilling into dangerous rock, and not working where ne was stationed by the shift boss, and that Jones himself was entirely at fault.
