Servian Regicides Are Raised in Rank.

WILL GUARD KING PETER NOW

Opened the Gates of the Palace for the Assassins of the Late King Alexander and Queen Draga—Confidants of Conspirators.

BEIGRADE, June 21.—The promotions are announced of various members of the military deputation to King Peter at Geneva. Colonel Popovitch, of the late King Alexander's palace guard, is created a General and First Aid-Captain to King Peter; Captain Ljovitch, who opened the palace gates for the assassins of the late King and Queen, is promoted to be a Major, and Lieutenant Gromica, who was on guard outside the palace on the night of the assassinations, and who was a confidant of the conspirators, is made a Captain.

Gala Day When Peter Comes Back. GENEVA, June 21.—King Peter this afternoon gave an audience to the Servian deputation and in the course of the proceedings expressed his approval of the programme for his reception at Belgrade, which will include a gala performance at the theater June 25.

MAD MULLAH A CLEVER FOE. British Would Be Glad to Be Out of Somaliland Campaign.

SIMLA, India, June 21.—Major-General Charles Comis Egerton, who has been in command of the Punjab frontier force since 1893, has been appointed to the command of the Somaliland expeditionary force, which are operating against the Mad Mullah, superseding Brigadier-General W. H. Manning, who took command of the British expedition in Somaliland last November, after a reverse suffered by Colonel E. M. Swayne, and successful in his campaign. Columns detached from the force have been badly mauled by the Mullah's followers, the most serious being the detachment of Colonel Plunkett's flying detachment of 200 men, with two Maxim, on April 17, when Colonel Plunkett, his officers and practically entire force were entirely wiped out. The latest advice received in London June 14 were to the effect that General Manning was surrounded and unable to assist Colonel Babb, whose column was in a serious position at Callady and on half rations.

One of the causes of the non-success of the expedition has been the cowardice of the native Somal regiment, of which so much was hoped when it was formed to reach the Mullah's camp. Only a few days ago that the native camel corps had mutinied. The operations against the Mad Mullah, who first raised the tribes against the British in 1894, and when the British expedition in Somaliland was in progress, a desire is manifested to abandon the campaign, but in view of the predicament of General Manning's forces, it has been found necessary to order British troops in India, and when the British expedition in Somaliland will consist of 800 British, 1200 Indian troops and 4000 natives.

FIGHT AT CHURCH DOOR. French Women Injured in an Anti-Clerical Riot.

PARIS, June 21.—Several riots arising out of collisions between clericals and anti-clericals are reported from several towns in the provinces in connection with religious processions. At Brest an anti-clerical mob attempted to secure the host from the hands of the priest, and the procession was about to re-enter the cathedral. A free fight ensued, in which 15 persons, mostly women, were injured. Less serious troubles occurred at Nantes and Anger.

CHANGES IN ITALIAN CABINET. Zanardelli Is Minister of the Interior, Morine Marine Minister.

ROME, June 21.—The King has accepted the resignations of Interior Minister Giolitti and Marine Minister Bottole. Premier Zanardelli will take the interior portfolio and interim, and when the cabinet is made Marine Minister. The other Ministers have been confirmed in their present posts. A royal decree is issued today, convening Parliament for June 25.

ARTIST LECTURES TO SAVANTS. E. W. Stokes Tells Geographical Society of Polar Exploration.

ROME, June 21.—Frank Wilber Stokes, an American artist, delivered today with great success a lecture in French on the coloration of the polar regions. The lecture was given under the auspices of the Geographical Society, and was held in the Collegio Romano was filled with a distinguished audience.

Hopes to End Cabinet Crisis. LONDON, June 21.—The Times correspondent at Vienna says Count Hodevsky, the Baz of Croatia, left that city for Budapest Sunday afternoon in order to negotiate a compromise between the various party leaders with a view to reaching the solution of the Hungarian Cabinet crisis. It is announced in Vienna that after a crown council, held Sunday morning, Count Hodevsky was instructed with this mission, and it is expected that he will eventually form a Cabinet.

Russia Denounced in Yiddish. LONDON, June 21.—A demonstration of thousands of East End Hebrews was held in Hyde Park this afternoon to protest against the Kishinev massacre. Speeches violently denouncing the Russian government were delivered in Yiddish simultaneously from a number of platforms.

OPERATORS' GRIEVANCES. Coal Conciliation Board Will Have Stories From Both Sides.

WILKESBAIRE, Pa., June 21.—When the conciliation board meets here on Thursday the operators will have grievances to be adjusted as well as the miners. This will be a surprise to many of the miners, who believed that the coal conciliation had nothing to do with the operators who take exceptions to the many petty strikes, also that the nonunion men are being interfered with.

Robbers Intimidate With a Gun and Get \$40. Unhindered by their failure of Saturday night, two masked highwaymen last night held up a Vancouver car and secured about \$40 in cash and some valuable jewelry from the passengers.

Conductor Tawney, who was in charge of the car, was slow about complying with the orders of the highwaymen, and they shot at him. He was not injured, however, and after the first shot was not so slow in obeying.

The robbery was committed about 12:40. The last Vancouver car was pulling into the barn. It had just passed Cloverdale, and was starting up slowly, when two masked men jumped aboard. There were but few passengers aboard. In response to the order of "Hands up," the conductor resisted and the first robber discharged a gun in his direction. This subdued him, and he allowed the robber to take his cash. Motorman Marshall was next overhauled, and forced to pump up. The passengers were then searched, but did not have much cash. Watches and jewelry were also taken by the highwaymen. The police were notified at once, and a search started, but no clue to the robbers was obtained last night.
