#### MAD MULLAH A CLEVER FOE. British Would Be Gind to Be Out of

SomniHand Campaign, SIMLA, India, June 21.—Major-General Charles Comin Egerton, who has been in command of the Punjab frontier force since 1899, has been appointed to the command of the Somaliland expeditionary forces, which are operating against the Mad Mullah, superseding Brigadier-General W. H. Manning, who took command of the British expedition in Somal-iland last November, after a reverse suf-fered by Colonel Swayne, has not proved successful in his campaign. Columns de-tached from the force have been badly mauled by the Mullah's followers, the most serious being the ambush of Colonel Piunkett's flying detachment of 308 men, with two Maxims, on April 17, when Colo-nel Plunkett, his officers and practically entire force were entirely wiped out. The latest advices received in London June 14 were to the effect that General Manning was surrounded and unable to assist Colonel Babb, whose column was in a serious position at Callady and on half

Only a few days ago news came hat the native camel corps had mutinted. The operations against the Mad Mullah, who first raised the tribes against the British in 1859, have already cost \$2,000,600.
