land amid profuse cheering. Cleveland Talking for Bryan!

Ex-State Senator David Ball, in a speech, pronounced William J. Bryan the greatest private citizen in the world. "When I see Grover Cleveland in the rear end of a train in Missouri, talking for Bryan, I will take back everything I ever said against him," he declared. _Ex-Governor Dockery urged the convention to stand by Governor Folk and everything he had done as Governor, "whether you like it, gentlemen, or not." he said. He spoke of Bryan as the next President.

Governor Folk was cheered. He de-clared Bryan would be nominated for President in 1968, and would be elected. He said the principles which Bryan had
