## THINKS GIRL WAS MURDERED

Coey Believes Rumbaugh Did It and Cast Suspicion on Him.

CHICAGO, July 31 .-- C. A. Coey, who Chanler tries to avoid going to insane asylum when he goes to New York to try has been prominently mentioned in the developments following the suicide of Laura Matthews at Colorado Springs, held a conference today with Mrs. Jennie Matthews, the mother of the girl, who arrived here today from Kansas City. At the conclusion of their interview both of them declared that in their opinion the girl had been murdered. Coey said he had traced the telegram said to have been sent to him by Miss Green, the nurse of Miss Matthews, and was satisfied that she did not send it. He further said:

"I believe that Miss Matthews' death is a plain case of murder. In my opinion Rumbaugh committed the deed and sent a telegram calculated to cast suspicion on me as being the cause of the girl's death. About 10 days ago I wrote Miss Matthews a cheerful letter, and she was talking of returning to Chicago. Rumbaugh was evidently afraid of losing the girl."

Runs in Front of Car.




