Few Homestead Entries.

There was nothing of especial interest transpired in the land office after the line was admitted in sections. Practically every applicant had his papers made out in correct form and was sworn and his number pinned to his documents. Not even entry fees were accepted until after checking up to ascertain the instances in which counter filings were made on the same lands. Comparatively few home-stead entries were made, the majority being under the stone and timber act. Some heavily timbered sections were more coveted than others, section 2 in 6-3 being a good example of this. There were fully ten entries made on these four quarters, while only four can possibly obtain patents. 




