Joint Session Next Month.

Preparations are being made for the meeting of Oregon Presbyterian synod, which will convene in the Third Presby-terian Church, East Pine and East Thirteenth streets, October 10. It will be a most important session of the synod for the reason that it will mark the final union of the synod of the mother church and the synod of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of this state. It was ordered by the general assembly that the two synods meet together and unite. Rev. E. B. Hayes, moderator of the Presby-terian synod, will preside. Rev. E. Nel-son Allen, moderator of the Cumberland synod, has been assigned to preach the annual sermon. The two synods will merge at this session, and the Cumber-

merge at this session, and the Cumber-land synod will pass forever. Some of the leading Presbyterian min-isters of the Pacific Coast and New York are expected to be present and take part in the proceedings. Friday night, October 11, Dr. Hicks, synodical missionary of California, will address the meeting on Sunday school affairs.
