Prominent Citizens Discuss Needs of Community in Better Highways. Legislature Will Be Asked to Pass Bond Issue Measure.

MEDFORD, Or., April 24.—(Special.)— Medford has taken the initiative step to-ward a greater Jackson County, begin-ning in a good roads mass meeting, held ning in a good roads mass meeting, held in the Operahouse tonight, at which a number of the prominent business men of this and adjoining towns spoke. The meeting was opened with an address by William Colvis, followed by speeches by W. I. Vawter, J. E. Enyart, W. H. Stalker, F. Osenbrugge, John M. Root, Judge Crowell, Judge Bunn and Joseph Hammersley. The programme was varied by the introduction of a number of vocal selections.

The tenor of the meeting was that good roads are wanted allke by the rich and those in moderate circumstances, and the question at issue was how are we to

the question at issue was how are we to obtain this desire?

Mr. Vawter offered as a feasable way of solving the problem to adopt plans and have the Legislators work to that end of securing legislation which would permit the issuance of bonds by the county for the building of these roads. Mr. Stalker unfolded New York's plan for road building, in which the state gives 50 per cent, the county 35 per cent and the township 15 per cent of the amount needed annually for the building and repair of roads.




