FULLER GETS NEW TRIAL

Court Decides Judge Erred in Rejecting Certain Testimony.

SALEM, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—
The Supreme Courttoday decided four appealed cases, reversing three of them. The most important was that of State against Dr. Roy Fuller, the man charged with causing the death of Mrs. Abbie Gover, of Baker County, by performing a criminal operation upon her.
