

PARESIS ENDS LIFE OF CARRIE NATION

Kansas Anti-Saloon Crusader Only Smiles When Told Death Is Near.

FIGHTING SPIRIT COOLED

Sanitarium Patient Goes Unrebuked for Smoking Cigarette—Worry Over Suit Against Lecture Bureau Is Keen.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 9.—Carrie Nation, the Kansas "saloon-smasher," died at 7:56 o'clock tonight. Paresis was the cause of death. Mrs. Nation had been in poor health for months and on January 27, hoping to recover from a nervous breakdown, she entered the sanitarium in which she died.

Litigation Causes Worry.

Worry over lawsuits which she had filed against a lecture bureau for alleged failure to register for, on the platform is said to have caused her illness. A nephew, P. G. Moore, of Kansas City, Kan., brought her here, thinking that quiet would restore her health. None but relatives and attendants has been allowed to see her.

Belligerent Spirit Lost.

The last five months of Mrs. Nation's life in the sanitarium were in marked contrast to her former activity. Once she saw a patient at the sanitarium smoking a cigarette. She made no remonstrance, merely saying that she had done all she could to "eradicate the evil."

Mrs. Nation first emerged from the sanitarium when she started upon her career as saloon wrecker in 1906.

It was on June 4 of that year that a stout matronly woman, with a broad countenance, went out into her back yard at Medicine Lodge, Kan., and collecting six or seven bricks, wrapped them separately in fragments of old newspapers. Thus equipped she set out in a buggy for the neighboring town of Kiowa, where she smashed three saloons in a single day.

Kiowa Made Famous.

Next morning the news went over the country. Mrs. Nation was famous. Kiowa was on the map, and the whole country laughed. Encouraged by the approval of the prohibition forces in Kansas, Mrs. Nation then embarked seriously upon the business of carrying terror and confusion to the saloonkeepers of the land. She was fairly successful. She was in Kentucky in 1907. Her maiden name was Carrie Moore, and as a girl, it is said, she was absolutely fearless. In her early life she was married to a man addicted to intoxicants, which created in her a great aversion to the sale. When he died she determined to devote her life to the suppression of liquor traffic.

Later she moved to Kansas and was married to David Nation, who sympathized with her temperance principles.

He divorced her in 1905.

Hatchet Wins National Fame.

Later on Mrs. Nation was welcomed on the lecture platform, and even entered the overcrowded ranks of vaudeville. Her personal emblem was the hatchet, and these she sold in almost every city of importance in America. A larger and more serviceable hatchet she smashed bars throughout the length and breadth of the land.

Mrs. Nation made one visit to Chicago, where she smashed one bar. After that the police guarded her so closely that she did not have an opportunity to do any more damage. She made an early start for England, taking her hatchet with her, and got into trouble the moment she landed. As the result of a raid on a saloon at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, she was arrested and fined. Later, while speaking in a Canterbury music hall, she was booed and hissed. A week later, at Newark, she was arrested and fined for smashing a glass cigarette sign with her umbrella.

Early in March she took ship to America, after having narrowly escaped a plot of some young blades in London, who planned to kidnap her and force her to give gin to her stomach. She was drunk, afterward leaving her in that condition.

Fear of Jail No Deterrent.

So persistent was Mrs. Nation in advertising her propaganda that she had been in jail more times than many hardened criminals. For wrecking bars and furnishings and otherwise disturbing the peace Mrs. Nation had been under arrest at Wichita three times, at Topeka seven times, at Kansas City once, at Coney Island once, at Pittsburg three times, at Scranton and Philadelphia and at other places. The fear of a jail sentence never deterred her.

Mrs. Nation's mother died in an asylum for the insane, her hallucination being that she was Queen Victoria.

Mrs. Nation was twice married. When her second husband declined to go to her rescue when she was locked up for disorderly conduct, she said, "Never mind, I'm better off without him." Notwithstanding her strenuous practices, Mrs. Nation had the name of being a private rather kindly woman. Her lecture tours and her hatchet are said to have brought her a fine income, but it is not apparent that she cared much about money.

JALISCO IS SHAKEN

Volcano of Colima, Newly Active, Does Damage.

DEATH LIST INCREASES

Railroad Station and Many Houses at Zapatlan Are Destroyed by Quake—More Bodies Recovered at Guadalajara.

MEXICO CITY, June 10.—Several dispatches to the Diario and the Herald report much damage from the earthquake in Zapatlan, in the state of Jalisco.

The railroad station and 220 houses were destroyed. It is believed that many people were killed and injured, but the number is not known. At the ranches and the smaller towns in the district great damage has been suffered.

According to these reports, Colima suffered great damage. The volcano of that name emitted streams of lava on the towns of San Andres and Tzucilac, where many houses were destroyed, but no details are given of the extent of the destruction. Telegrams from Zapatlan by way of Guadalajara indicate that 16 bodies have been recovered at that point in addition to 24 injured who are in the hospital.

DIAZ IS MUCH INTERESTED

He Stays Up Late on Liner to Hear of News From Mexico City.

ON BOARD STEAMSHIP YPIRANGA, June 9.—General Porfirio Diaz received news of the earthquake in Mexico and the arrival of Senator Madero at the capital by wireless last night, while his steamship was about 1000 miles due east of Cape Hatteras.

All night long the ship was in communication with the United Wireless operator at Atlantic City and ex-President Diaz postponed his usually early retiring hour until long after midnight to receive all the available news of the happenings in his country.

The wireless worked beautifully. After the first brief bulletins of the earthquake and the announcement that the number of dead might reach 150 or more, there came a brief account of Madero's reception at the capital.

Then, as the wireless continued to work smoothly the Atlantic City operator sent fuller details, following them with long clippings from the metropolitan dailies and newspaper comments of various sorts on the Mexican situation.

Diaz read all eagerly. He expressed great sorrow over the earthquake disaster and desired that his sympathy should be communicated to his people. He said he hoped the casualties would prove less serious on further investigation.

SOLDIER ESCAPES GUARD

PRISONER UNDER SENTENCE AT VANCOUVER ELUDES PURSUER.

RE-ENLISTED AFTER DESERTING FROM HOSPITAL CORPS AT WEST POINT.

Government Offers Reward.

YANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash.

June 9.—(Special.)—John G. Dempsey, of the Hospital Corps of this post, a prisoner waiting to be taken to Alcatraz Island, to serve a term of three years for desertion and fraudulent enlistment, escaped from a guard at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon and ran to the bushes.

THE GUARD FIRED AFTER HIM, BUT MISSED.

The officer on guard was notified, and in a few minutes the full post police and extra men were looking for the fugitive, but at a late hour tonight he had not been found.

DEMPEY WAS FORMERLY IN THE HOSPITAL CORPS AT THE FORT AT WEST POINT, BUT DESERTED IN 1908.

In April, 1911, he enlisted at this post under the name of Dempsey, and a short time ago was found by the identification marks on his body. He was tried and sentenced to three years at hard labor. He was being detained until a number of prisoners are sent to the Island.

DEMPEY, OR WALTERS, AS HE CALLED HIMSELF, WAS ENLISTED AT WEST POINT, IS 28 YEARS OLD, AND IS 5 FEET 5 INCHES TALL.

He has blue eyes, brown hair, and a ruddy complexion, and is smooth-shaven, with a short and stocky and weighs 150 pounds.
