LEAVENWORTH, Kan. June 2.-Carrie Nation, the Kansas "saloon-smasher," died at 7:05 o'clock tonight. Parcels was the cause of death. Mrs. Nation had been in poor health for months and on January 27, hoping to recover from a nervous breakdown, she entered the sanitarium in which she

It became evident several days ago that Mrs. Nation could not recover and Dr. A. L. Sumalsky, a physician at the sanitarium, informed her that the end She said nothing, but WAN DORE. She became unconscious at on today and did not revive. Relatives had been telegraphed for, but only Dr. Sumalsky and a nurse at the bedside when she died.

Litigation Causes Worry.

Worry over lawsuits which she had filed against a lecture bureau for alleged failure to pay for services on the platform is said to have caused her liness. A nephew, P. G. Moore, of Kansas City, Kan, brought her here, thinking that quiet would restore her health. None but relatives and attendants has been allowed to see her. A recent attempt to serve her with summons in a suit was balked by the owner of the sanitarium. Mrs. Nation was not permitted even to read her mail, as the doctors feared the letters might contain some hint of the pending

It was on June 6 of that year that a stout matronity woman, with a broad countenance, went out into her back yard at Medicine Lodge, Kan., and collecting six or seven bricks, wrapped them separately in fragments of old newspapers. Thus equipped she set out in a biggy for the neighboring town of Klowa, where she smashed three salcons in a single day.

PRISONER UNDER SENTENCE AT VANCOUVER ELUDES PURSUER.

Re-enlisted After Deserting From Hospital Corps at West Point. Government Offers Reward.
