RECORD CORN DEAL

Sale Involving 351,000 Cases of Spot Iowa Corn Closed.

GROCERS ARE INTERESTED

Largest Transaction in the History of the Business Shows What the Buyers Think of the Outlook for This Year's Pack.

The grocery trade of the entire country is interested in a canned goods sale made recently, which beats all records for size. The deal was closed in lows. Three hundred and fifty thousand cases total red and fifty thousand cases total as the largest single transaction in spot orn known to have been made. It removes from first hands all but an unimportant quantity of spot goods and is taken much made in the canned goods trade to indicate an unsatisfactory outlook for the new sweet corn crop, as it is plainly intimated that this immense quantity of corn was purchased to cover heavy sales of futures.

"Large Eastern interests, with the greatest distributing facilities of any concern in the United States, believed there was less spet canned corn than many people thought and, on looking over the situation very thoroughly, confirmed this opinion and have closed contracts and disposed of 351,000 rases of spot corn in the past 30 days, which reduces the holding in Iowa to possibly 50,000 to 60,000 cases.


