CLARK COUNTY IS TO GET 75,-000 TROUT EGGS.

Crossbreed Between Steelhead and Cutthroat Said to Produce Finest Fish in Existence.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 17.—(Special.)—General Superintendent of State Fish Hatcheries, John M. Crawford, who is overlooking improvements and repairs in the Columbia River hatcheries, announced today that he had received 75,000 trout eggs for Clark County from Lake Chelan hatchery. Thirty thousand of these are a cross between the steel-head and cutthroat trout of Lake Chelan—a successful experiment in breeding which has been carried on for four years.

"Although larger, the cross takes the appearance of the cutthroat," says Mr. Crawford. "In the lakes already planted the fish display all the gameness of the cutthroat, combined with the strength of the steelhead, and they are undoubtedly the finest fish in existence today. Their introduction into these waters will be of keen interest to local sportsmen."

Since arriving here Mr. Crawford have received advices from the Federal trou hatchery in Colorado, saying that 200, 909 black Colorado trout will be shipped and the colorado trout will be shipped to the Chicago Produce Markel.
