All agree that to make any radical
change it would be necessary to have
an amendment to the charter. Mayor
Rushlight points out that it will be
impossible to force the owner of a vacant lot to pay a water charge, par-ticularly as he has no water to be cut off. He favors changing the law so that the water tax would be included in

the general city tax.
"It is manifestly unjust that the va-cant property, enhanced in value be-cause of the installation of the water, cause of the installation of the water, should pay no tax," figures Mayor Rushlight. "Tax all property owners and the burden of supporting the water system will be more equally distributed."


CONDON, Or., Sept. 18.—(Special.)—Mrs. Sarah Myers, wife of W. S. Myers, died here Sunday at the age of 70.
