The weather man gave the Easter hats a bare chance for their lives by tacking a thin strip of fair weather across the middle of yesterday, but few owners of Easter hats took the opportunity, for this fleeting segment sunshine was walled in on both sides by drizzling rain and sifting snow. The declaration of the weather forecaster on the day previous that Easter hats probably would be worn largely in hat-boxes at home, proved true and his prophecies of "rain or snow" were amply fulfilled.

The "Easter parade" was out on the kniedoscopic glory of the new Spring hat, and while the crowd filled nearly all of the churches, and packed the cars and thronged the sidewalks before and after service, quiet colors generally were prevalent. By contrast with the rainy day colors of the crowd, such Spring hats as were brought out in defiance of the weather and the weather forecaster, shone by the glory of contrast and, in the brief period between 12 and 1 o'clock, when the weather was comparatively clear, had the triumph all to themselves.
