BUCHAREST. March 21.—Ex-Premier P. P. Carp, leader of the conservative party in the Rumanian Parliamene, is reported to have said today that in view of the capture of Adrianople by the Bulgarians, the claims of Rumania for the rectification of her frontier now would include territory within a line drawy from Turtukai, on the Danke, 28 miles west of Sileateria, to Baltchick, 23 miles north of the port of Varna, on the Black Sea, thus taking in a considerable silce of Bulgarian territory.
