



Professor Saville told of finding sev-Professor Sayille told of finding several skulls in his wanderings, the teeth of which were in a remarkable state of preservation, considering that they gave evidence of being considerably more than 1000 years old. Many of the teeth, he said, were filled with gold, and the deliciacy of the workmanship compared very favorably with that of modern dentists. But more remarkable still were the teeth which showed little designs of gold and silver inlaid in the designs of gold and silver inlaid in the enamel. Other teeth had gold bands stretched around their edges.

The two brothers, with their father, built a log house, where the Camas Hotel now stands, the property having been acquired from the Government and paid for in land warrants purchased from the widow of the late Captain Scott, who died from wounds received in the Cayuse Indian war.
