Over 100 Entries of Fine Poultry on View at Lents.

1500 VISITORS ATTRACTED

Long List of Awards Is Made and Something Provided for All Exhibitors, While Stock Wins High Praise From Officials.

More than 100 entries were made at the Lents School poultry show yesterday by pupils, about 600 birds being displayed. These were the pick of 181 birds raised as the result of the show, which are valued at \$1000.

Miss Mattie Train had charge of the preparations for the show and directed the pupils. Principal Hershner had general charge. Mrs. Olive Kelly and Mrs. Pearl V. Freeberger were the judges. Every child who made an entry received a token of some sort.

REGISTRATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES

SECRETARY OF STATE PREPARES FOR 1914 LICENSE TASK. 10,000 Blank Applications for Registration of Automobiles and Chauffeurs Are Sent to Owners. GALEN, Or., Nov. 26.—(Special.)—Secretary of State Olcott has mailed about 10,000 blank applications for registration of automobiles and chauffeurs for 1914. There will be a different number plate for pleasure and commercial cars than for motorcycles, the motorcycle plates having a dark blue background with white letters and figures. The applications have been mailed to County Clerks and owners of garages, so that there will be no question that all owners of automobiles and chauffeurs receive them. The state will receive about \$56,000 for automobile licenses next year, which will be \$14,000 more than was received this year. The money received from registrations under the motor vehicle law is apportioned to the counties of the state in proportion to the number of registered motor vehicles in them.
