Question of New Party Proves Disturbing Factor.

MANY QUIT ORGANIZATION

Plans Even Not Understood, as It Is Not Known Whether Intention Is to Put Own Candidates in Field or Not.

Opinions of Portland suffragists regarding the founding of a Woman's party differ widely.

Some of the local leaders favor the formation of the party as advocated by the Congressional Union for Woman's Suffrage. Some condemn the Chleago women who withdrew from the union in anticipation of the founding of this party. Others are not at all in favor of the organizations being launched, contending that it is a grave mistake to draw a line separating the sexes in politics. With others the decision to be made is one of "loyalty to womanhood or loyalty to tradition."

Lack of Unity Decried.

The is pitiful to think that women can't stand as a solid body at this citical time for woman's suffrage," sald Mrs. W. J. Hawkins yesterday in discussing the action of the Chicago women who withdrew from the Union on account of the intention of that body to form the new party in Chicago on June 4.

Mrs. Hawkins is one of the most prominent members of the Congressional Union in Oregon. She declared that the women who had withdrawn had in all probability put tradition and their own political beliefs before the woman question.

Misg Emma Wold, who presided at the mass meeting in the Library, April 30, when the Eastern suffragists were here, said that if the "Woman's party" put up candidates and made the organization political, she would feel obliged to withdraw from the Congressional Union, staunch supporter that she is.

Plans Not Understood.

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"It is unfortunate that they are to call it a woman's 'party." said Miss Wold. "Miss Lucy Burns assured me, when here last week, that there was no intention to put forth candidates, but merely to get women together to work solidly for the Susan B. Anthony amendment. However, I do not believe in separating the sexes into real political parties," declared Miss* Wold, "and should they form this into a woman's party in the common acceptance of the word 'party,' I would feel forced to step out, but I would still work with all my strength for the Federal amendment."

Ohio Delegates Expected to Be Among Last to Leave Favorite

Real Fight May Develop.

If the contest at Chicago, during the early balloting, develops into a fight between Hughes and Roosevelt, delegates instructed for Cummins, Ford, a Sherman, LaFollette and others will be drawn into the real contest, and their instructions will be disregarded. The Burton men from Ohio and the Cummins delegation from lowa likely will be the last to get into line. Figuring that such a breakup will come, the New York Herald, after an extensive canvass, analyzed the vote of 23 states that had selected delegates prior to April 30. The Herald's summary is incomplete, because not now up to date, but gives an interesting slamt to the estuation as it existed a week ago. It follows: Rossevelt, Hughes,

Since the foregoing table was published six states have held primaries or conventions and elected uninstructed delegates. The Colorado convention, while not instructing its 12 delegates, was favorable to Hughes, and Utah's eight and Maryland's 16 are said to lean toward him. Washington and California delegations are presumably divided between Hughes and Rooseveit, with the majority for the former. Arizona elected "regulars" as delegates.

A conservative estimate would give Hughes 42 additional votes from Colorado, Utah, Maryland and Arizona, and 25 of the 49 elected from Washington and California. The revised figures stand: Roosevelt, 165; Hughes, 226.

though the 87 delegates from that state, the home of both Hughes and Rooseveit, will go to the convention uninstructed, estimates by various New York papers indicate that about 50 delegates, more or less, entertain a personal preference for Hughes, and the Roosevelt strength is estimated at from 12 to 15, with the remainder favoring Root.

Massachusetts, which was to have had a favorite son in Senator Weeks, did not instruct her delegates, and that omission seems to have put the finishing touches to what remained of the Weeks boom. Weeks may get the complimentary vote of the entire delegation at the outset, but Massachusetts will not long remain a unit and when the split comes there will be some support for McCail. There is little evidence of Hughes sentiment in the state at present. Southern delegates, as a rule, like to be on the winning side.

Georgia and Louisiana will send contesting delegations to the Chicago convention. Both factions in Louisiana favor the Colonel, but in Georgia the contest lies between a delegation favoring Roosevelt and a delegation for "anybody but Rooseveit." Much will depend on the outcome of the contest where this state turns up.


